OUR DONORS' DOLLARS HARD AT WORK

With donations we are able to fulfill the needs of the Hospital as they are identified by the staff and Board of Directors. Each year the donations from the previous year are used to purchase equipment, provide staff education, and/or contribute to program maintenance and expansion, wherever the need may be. For example, donations received during the 2002/2003 fiscal year contributed to the purchase of a pulse oximeter, which is used to determine oxygen levels in the blood, an electronic blood pressure monitor, a recumbent bike for physiotherapy and two portable oxygen delivery systems.

In the ever-changing world of health care and with almost daily advancements in technology, staff education is vital. Your donations have helped the staff of St. Joseph's maintain current knowledge of trends in the health care field.

At any given time, four days a week, there is a good chance you will be greeted by the friendly face of our golden retriever, Bailey. Bailey is only one of the many animals that make up the pet therapy program at St. Joseph's. As well, every Wednesday, an afternoon tea is hosted in Palliative Hospice Care to give patients and their families an opportunity to visit. These are but a few examples of programs made possible through donors' support.

RESIDENT STORY

Water therapy isn't for everyone but Dr. Walter Gainer certainly looks forward to the weekly swim program at St. Joseph's. The warm circulating water and attention of trained volunteers and staff ensure residents receive maximum therapeutic benefit from the sessions. Dr. Gainer's personal calendar is full – he and his wife make sure to pencil in entertainment programs – especially country music and he's a regular participant in the Reach for the Top competition with other continuing care centres.

St. Joseph's residents were at the top of their game last year having secured first place in the regional competition and they fully expect to repeat their success this year. In his working life Dr. Gainer was a professor of economics, logically, he enjoys the opportunity to challenge his memory and analytical skills. When not engaged in intellectual competitions, Dr. Gainer takes advantage of the opportunity to attend theatre events, lake trips and shopping excursions. Chatting with Walter over a cup of coffee, he said that recreation activities are a great change from the regular routine and values the stimulating and well organized calendar of events.

A DONOR'S STORY

A grocery store on the prairies was a far cry from the forestry career in Boistown, New Brunswick that Tubby Bateman had come to know when his family decided to move in 1914. Opening his first grocery store in 1932 was just one of his many great achievements that contributed to his involvement and passion for the community.

Upon sitting down with the late Mr. Bateman's daughter, Mary Agnes Radostits, to discuss the family's love of philanthropy and their charitable giving to St. Joseph's Hospital, I was filled with an overwhelming sense of what it truly means to give. The Bateman and Radostits family-owned IGA grocery stores in Edmonton and area are currently in the third generation of ownership. All of Verda and Tubby's children and grandchildren remain steadfast to their belief of giving back to the community that supports them.

Upon establishing the Verda & W.C. (Tubby) Bateman Foundation, the decision to make St. Joseph's Hospital a charity of choice was an easy one for the Bateman family, "St. Joe's has always been a favorite", says Mary Agnes. The relationship between St. Joseph's and the Bateman family began back in the early 1950s when Mrs. Bateman would visit the residents of St. Joseph's Hospital on 82nd Avenue and invite the Sisters from the Hospital for get-togethers at the Bateman home or lake cottage. Mary Agnes' grandmother, uncle and mother were all residents at St. Joseph's and are remembered by many staff who cared for them. In speaking of the care her mother received, Mary Agnes says, "Sister Benilda was her guardian angel while she was here".

The Bateman Family Foundation has made a significant impact on St. Joseph's through their financial gifts. They have established the Bateman Staff Mission Award which recognizes, by way of peer nomination, those employees who live the mission of St. Joseph's on a daily basis – To Provide Quality Care with Compassion in the Christian Tradition. As well, by making a major financial donation to the proposed St. Joseph's Hospital's All-Season Conservatory project, the Bateman Family Foundation has demonstrated their support of enhancing the quality of life for the residents and patients.

This is just one example of the support we receive on a daily basis and are truly grateful to have friends in the community such as the Bateman family. We thank all those that have supported us through our seventy-six years of service in Edmonton, and look forward to providing "quality care with compassion" for years to come.

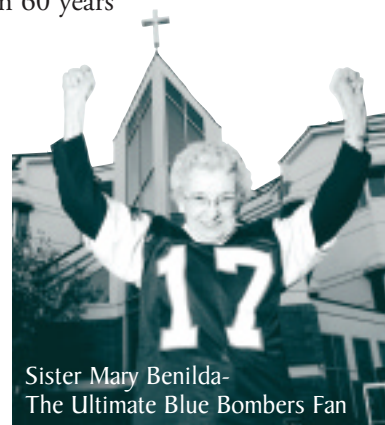
We are happy to announce that for the second year in a row, the Dinner and Auction raised approximately \$60,000, which will support the upcoming Ambulance Bay/Conservatory

IDENTIFYING THE NEED

Each year, the Board of Directors of St. Joseph's Hospital is presented with a list of needs compiled by staff. These needs are assessed and the board determines the source of funding used to fulfill each need as they are approved. The board approves programs, equipment and projects to be funded by donations. It is then the goal of the Fund Development Office to secure outside funding and support for these projects. A degree of "clinical atmosphere" in a hospital, whether it be long-term or acute care, is inevitable. We have a vision at St. Joseph's that all components contributing to a clinical setting will be altered to give the facility an "at home" feeling. The dining rooms, hallways, and bedrooms on each floor will be decorated to give these living areas a more comfortable, cozy feeling. Taking a bath has always been considered

relaxing and soothing; as such, it should be a special experience each and every time. For this reason, we will endeavor to transform each of the twelve bathing areas into individual mini-spas. With greenery, scents, music, and mist, the residents will be greeted by an 'Eden' to call their own each time they bathe.

By maintaining a focus on staff and resident safety, the hospital has identified the need to outfit the facility with low-style beds, which sufficiently lower to the floor so as to improve ease of access in and out of bed as well as significantly reduce the risk of injury, should a fall occur. This proposed initiative is forecast to take five years, replacing forty beds each year for a total of 200 beds by 2008.

With the inevitable direct benefit these projects will bring to the residents, we are all very excited to see them brought to fruition and thus, once again, improve the quality of care our residents receive each and every day.

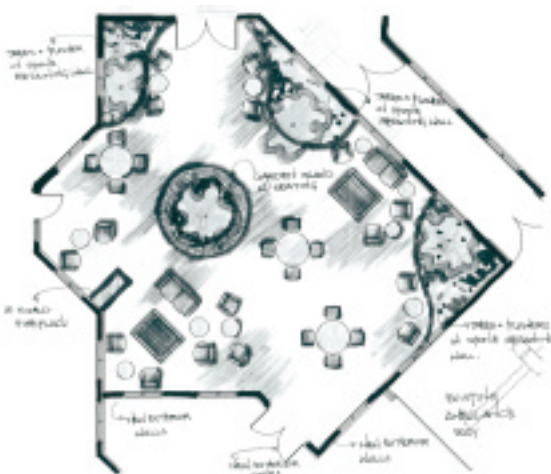
ALL-SEASON CONSERVATORY/AMBULANCE BAY EXPANSION: A CAPITAL PROJECT

As a 204 bed continuing care facility, the residents of St. Joseph's call the hospital home year round. In addition, living in a diverse climate where the winter season can last as long as seven months, the residents of St. Joseph's tend to remain indoors. Thus the need has been identified to have a tropical environment that can be accessed year round. This all-season conservatory will be a serene oasis that will provide residents and families with a therapeutic atmosphere by way of audio, visual, and aromatic stimuli.

In coordination with the development of an all-season conservatory, expansion to the current ambulance bay has also been proposed. Our current ambulance bay was designed in the early 1990's to accommodate emergency and Disabled Adult Transportation System (DATS) vehicles.

Since that time, emergency vehicles have grown in size and the current space cannot accommodate these newer vehicles. In 1997 St. Joseph's successfully raised funds to purchase a wheelchair coach for residents, which is too large to access the existing ambulance bay. It is parked outdoors which requires considerable labour to clean snow and warm the vehicle before it can be used by residents. The addition of a second bay and enlargement of the original bay will enable the residents' coach to be sheltered and provide access for all emergency and DATS vehicles.

Since the beginning when the Sisters of Providence would set out on "exhausting begging tours" to raise money which was put toward continuing the mission, the staff, volunteers, board and families have been sharing the story of St. Joseph's.

What sets St. Joseph's Auxiliary Hospital apart from other continuing care facilities in Edmonton? What story has been shared for seventy-six years that compels people to give?

The story of St. Joseph's must be heard as a whole to fully appreciate what differentiates this facility from other continuing care facilities in Edmonton. There are many care facilities (some faith-based), there are Palliative Hospice Programs, there are Community Day Support Programs and there is access to Peritoneal Dialysis in the region; the fact that St. Joseph's Hospital offers all of these programs and services under one roof is a reality that sets us apart.

While offering programs and services to people of all faiths, cultures, ages, abilities and interests, the staff of St. Joseph's remains mission-focused and steadfast to addressing all the needs of those we serve, be it spiritual, physical, mental or emotional. Through its mission, St. Joseph's is focused not only on maintaining, but improving, quality of life.

St. Joseph's offers a Continuing Care Program second-to-none, which focuses on meeting individual needs, promoting independence and restoring health and well-being to the greatest extent possible.

As a center of expertise for Huntington Disease, St. Joseph's specializes in meeting the unique needs of clients with Huntington Disease by providing trained staff and an environment that supports independence for HD clients. In 1996, St. Joseph's was proud to bridge the transition between

community and continuing care by welcoming the Huntington's Resource Centre to the Hospital.

St. Joseph's customized Palliative Hospice Program incorporates our strong mission and values into services that are compassionate and ethically based while meeting the holistic needs of palliative care patients and their families. Palliative Hospice Care is a unique program that enables terminally ill patients to access care in a supportive environment that focuses on maintaining quality of life and personal comfort.

Our Community Day Support Program offers Nursing Services, Occupational, Physical and Recreation Therapy in a bright, cheerful environment. Operating Monday through Friday, the program is open to adults with rehabilitation needs.

Residents requiring Peritoneal Dialysis and who are unable to reside at home, receive treatment at St. Joseph's in our seven bed program. Working in collaboration with the Northern Alberta Renal Program at the University of Alberta Hospital, Home Peritoneal Dialysis Unit and the Capital Health Authority Central Assessment and Placement Services, St. Joseph's is able to provide specialized care within an environment that promotes independence as well as client and family involvement.

For seventy-six years, St. Joseph's has been proud to share its story of commitment and contribution to the community in an effort to improve quality of life. It is truly with great pride and blessing that we are able to continue offering these unique and innovative programs and services to those that require continuing care.



THE NEW FUND DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

In an effort to uphold the high quality of care that St. Joseph's Hospital has been able to provide its residents since 1927, a formalized Fund Development Program has been initiated. The goal of this program is to supplement the current funding St. Joseph's receives from government sources, with much needed support from our friends and neighbours in the community.

THE TREE OF LIFE

The search to find a creative way to acknowledge donations made to St. Joseph's became a reality in 1997, our seventieth anniversary year, in the form of a tree that celebrates both life and giving. Metal leaves on the tree reflect natural earth tones of Gold, Burgundy, Copper and Green. As the leaves are added, the colours complement the tree, made of butternut wood, to reflect the richness of colour and design seen in nature.

As donor names are added to one of the four leaf categories, a metal leaf will "grow" on the sculpture. Each leaf acknowledges an individual gift within a particular category or level of donation.

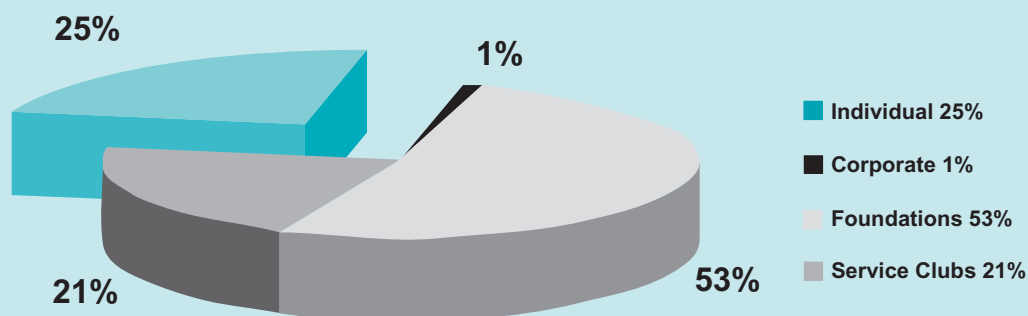
